PFFD NEWS



With cookout season just around the corner, your Pigeon Forge Fire Department offers a few tips to keep everyone safe around the grill.

- Propane and charcoal grills should only be used outdoors
- Grills should be placed well away from the home and deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area
- Keep grills clean by removing grease or fat buildup from grills and trays below
- Never leave grills unattended
- Always make sure the gas grill lid is open before lighting
- Use only charcoal starter fluid to light charcoal grills; never add charcoal fluid or other flammable liquids to the fire
- When finished grilling, let coals cool completely before disposing in a metal container

PFPD PATROL



Chief Jack Baldwin retired on February 2, 2018, after more than 42 years of service to the City of Pigeon Forge. During his tenure as Chief of Police, he was a catalyst for change within the department, emphasizing the use of modern technologies for law enforcement.

Jack Baldwin was appointed Chief of Police by the Pigeon Forge City Council in July 1975. Under his supervision, the Pigeon Forge Police Department saw many changes, which can be attributed to Chief Baldwin. The department has grown to 59 sworn officers and 14 civilian personnel. During this growth, Chief Baldwin incorporated the use of modern policing concepts by instituting comprehensive general orders and policies for the department.

The men and women of Pigeon Forge Police Department are going to miss the man who led them in their service to the city. Thanks for a job well done, Chief.

PIGEON FORGE SCRAPBOOK



Families raised the windows and enjoyed the springtime air in early Pigeon Forge. This stately Butler family home looked out over a pastoral farm of wheat and hay fields and long rows of crops. The Butlers, as other Forge families, enjoyed visiting with neighbors on the front porch. This house stood east of the present-day Parkway, near where it intersects with Pine Mountain Road. Before the Parkway, the home faced the Little Pigeon River but was redesigned with an entrance on the new boulevard after it was constructed around the 1950s. Thanks to the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation, the Pigeon Forge Fire Department received two compressed air foam systems, valued at \$19,600. The systems provide fire suppression capabilities in areas without access to hydrants or other standard water sources, including brushfires, wildland fires, vehicle fires and exposure fires, and allow firefighters to provide safe and efficient services to the community.
